<u>Writing</u>

This year, one of our school improvement priorities is to improve the way that we teach writing. KS1 and KS2 teaching staff attended a course in September with Teresa Heathcote that focused on the writing sequence. Children are following a structured process in writing lessons including immersion, skills and writing lessons. The immerse stage involves children having lots of different opportunities to develop vocabulary through books, videos, drama, trips and experiences.

We have already seen amazing improvements in the language children are using in their writing. KS1 have been focusing on dictated sentences to make sure they are using their phonics knowledge accurately in their sentences. We have been using quality texts and media to support the teaching of writing. The focus this term for each class is:

Willow - current book of the week is 'Penguin Small' Sycamore - Paddington - The original story of the bear from Peru. Maple - The Story of Tutankhamum Hazel - The Arrival

Please talk to your children about these texts and then have a look at their writing when you come on parent's evening.

<u> OPAL - Field update</u>

Work will start on the fence around the field next Tuesday. Once it is finished we will then be able to start taking the children out on the field at lunchtime.

In order to do this we will need to make sure that the children have appropriate clothing and footwear for the weather. Mr Elliott has made storage for Wellies so we now have space to keep them safe and dry whilst they're not being used. We do have some wellies in school, but not nearly enough for all the children that we have. Please send in a pair of wellies (pegged together) for your child that they can keep in school and use every day.

Children will also need waterproof coats (and possibly waterproof trousers) that are able to get muddy. These can be bought in on a day to day basis, or, again, could be kept in school.

<u>Curriculum</u>

We continue to work on developing our school curriculum to ensure that our children get the very best offer.

Willow Class - will continue their learning through the seasons with a focus on hot and cold seasonal change.

Maple Class - *Roaming in the Rainforest*. In this theme children learn about life in the rainforest and their importance to world climate.

Hazel Class - Arkwright's Legacy. This is a local History unit in which the children will be learning about the industrial revolution and the impact that it had on the people of Derbyshire.
